History of the United States

Course Perspective:

The academic course is a survey of the historiography of the United States relative to the African American experience. From this perspective, the course will interrogate the ethno-genesis of the African American culture in the Caribbean, the early Colonial era, the Civil War, the European Trans-Atlantic Enslavement of Africans, and the early free and autonomous Black towns and communities that they established before the Civil War. Through a selection of readings and films, the salient and transformative contributions of African Americans to the socio-cultural, religious, philosophical, political, and literary oeuvre of the United States will be discussed.

Heuristic Objectives of the Course:

- The student should be able to demonstrate basic historical research techniques, and apply these techniques to the study of the early period of African American history.
- II. The student should be able to identify and define the historical facts of the African American experience in the United States before 1865.
- III. The student should be ale to analyze the social, political, and economic contributions of African Americans within the framework of the general history of the early period of the United States.

Theoretical Orientation:

The analysis of the course materials and discussions will be framed by Dr.

Ronald Taakaki's the "Master Narrative" and the existential efforts of African

Americans to reduce social differentiation.

Grades and Grading Criteria:

There are two examinations: Midterm and Final. The students are graded on an absolute scale of relative to their Midterm (40%) and the Final examinations (40%) in the determination of their final course grade. Ten percent of your grade is determined by the average grade of the two In Class Interim Essay questions. And, class participation is (10%) of your grade and it determined by several factors: class conduct, this includes, but is not limited to your participation in class discussions in a germane and constructive manner and your professional/collegial comportment in class. Attendance expected and it is vital to your grade.

The Midterm Examination will be administered on September 27, 2012. The examination will consist of true and false questions and one essay question. The essay will consist of two to three pages in length.

The Final Examination will be administered at the end of the semester. The Final examination will consist of true and false questions and two essay questions.
