- 1) Student will be able to assess and describe the three sociological theories and how they impact sociological research.
- 2) Student will be able to utilize a research design to complete social research and analyze the data to come to a sociological conclusion.
- 3) Student will be able to define a social problem they have experienced and discuss solutions to reduce, educate or eliminate such problems in society.

Teaching Philosophy:

My goal is for you to be successful in this class while strengthening your skills as a life-long learner. If you run into trouble, fear you're falling behind or simply do not understand something, you should never hesitate to come see me during my office hours. Asking questions during class is, of course, welcomed as well. However, I understand some people may be too shy to ask a question in front of other students. So if you have a question but are too shy to ask during class, contact me, and we'll figure out the answers together.

Course Requirements:

1) Participation and Attendance: (30 points)

Since Sociology is the study of people and their behavior, your participation is not only welcomed, but required. Attendance is mandatory in this class and points can be earned for students with two absences or less. I will allow two absences for the semester, then will deduct 10 points from your total points in the class every time you are absent for a total of 30 points. Students with excessive absences will not earn attendance points and students with three or more absences can be excluded from the class. You are responsible for dropping the class through the Admissions Office Online. Please be disciplined about your education and attend consistently. Enrolled students who are absent on the first day of class are subject to being dropped by the instructor.

Please be on time and plan to stay for the <u>entire</u> class. A late arrival or early departure--10 minutes or more -- is the equivalent of one absence. No walking in and out of class.

- 5) Exams (2 Midterm Exams and One Final Exam): (130 points total)

All exams will be in class exams which will focus on the general issues covered in class and the reading. Please note that not all material covered in the reading will be covered in class and vice versa. Thus, you are responsible for both reading and in-class material. The exams will consist of multiple choice questions. The first midterm

covers Chapters 1-5 and is worth 50 points. The second midterm covers Chapters 14, 7, 8 and 10 and is worth 40 points. The final exam covers Chapters 11, 12, 13, and 18 and is worth 40 points.

All papers must be typed, using fonts no bigger than 12 with margins no larger than one inch. Please use spell check.
