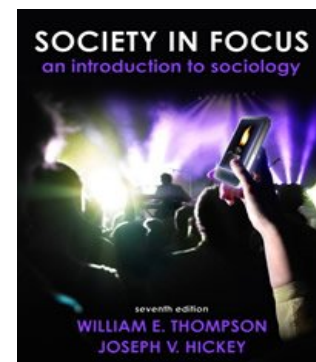

How to complete this class successfully?

Final Exam = Chapters 12-13,18, 20 = 60 points

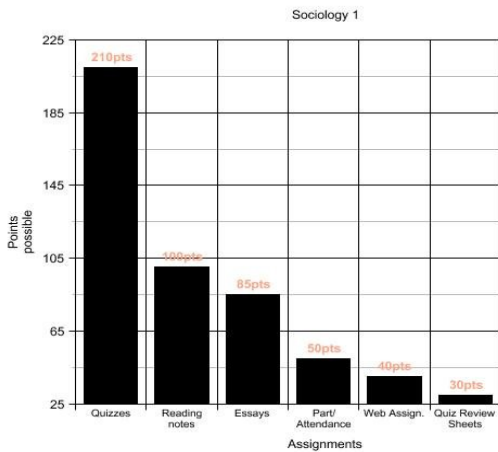
