# Assignment & Project Submission Guidelines

## **Project & Assignment Submission**

All final projects & assignments are to be submitted digitally on Canvas. Please follow class procedures and instruction on uploading files to an assignment.

**{We will NOT use Behance.net this semester - which was in some videos}**

Students are required to back up all work as it is completed. Loss of data is no excuse for not having work.

LATE Project Grading Policy: It is wise to still turn in late work after the due date. I will accept projects up to 6 days past the due date. In that period of time, -4% will be deducted each day.

## Academic Honesty

In the real world, if you're late with your assignments, or your assignments are incomplete you can lose your job and damage your professional reputation. It is crucial that you plan your time well to get all of your assignments completed. Plan ahead in the event something goes wrong with your final presentations. If projects are turned in on time but are not completed, penalties will be determined based upon the level of completion.

Learning takes place within an atmosphere of trust and respect. The following behaviors erode academic integrity, and thus create barriers to your ability to learn:

- spending less than the time necessary to do an adequate job;
- skipping readings or non-graded activities;
- clicking through course information without taking the time to review resources.

While these behaviors can affect your grade and your learning experience, they are personal choices. Other behaviors, however, move beyond 'choices' and breach academic rules and regulations, and even laws. These include:

- plagiarizing text by copying and pasting from web sites, blogs, other discussions, or published texts;
- re-using an essay or project you already turned in for another class;
- cheating on a test or project;
- copying directly from another student or another source without crediting the source;
- buying or copying an essay or project from an internet source.

Let's discuss two things: prevention and consequences:

I'd like to discuss the positive side first - prevention! I've often found that students who have broken the rules are legitimately confused. I'm here to help clear up that confusion. If you are not sure how to cite a source, integrate a quote, or acknowledge someone when you summarize, let me help you. We can arrange a short phone conference or in-person meeting, or I can give you feedback on a draft. Writing rules can be confusing - let's clear it up!

But now the negative. The college really doesn't care if you break the rules on purpose or by accident - the consequences are the same. In my class, the first time you misquote, misrepresent, or copy/paste, you will have to re-do the work, and meet with me for a one-on-one. The second time, we meet again, but you are not allowed to re-do the assignment, and get a zero for that grade. The third time, you will not pass the class. So let's be proactive! If you are not sure how to cite, ask!

Make sure all work is completed solely by you, this includes artwork. You are in this course to learn and if someone else is completing to your work then you will not be benefiting from the instruction.

## How to Succeed in This Course

As a technical, and Art/Design course, students should expect to spend 4-10 hours per week of time outside of class working on online material, projects, and exercises assigned for class. The more time you spend working on this material - the more you are going to comprehend and the more successful you may be.

1. **Attend class** (thanks Captain Obvious): Choose to attend all class periods on time and don't leave early. If you are absent on a day try and work with a partner to get caught up. Also, knowledge in any technology-based class is extremely cumulative. What you miss one day will continue to hurt you throughout the rest of the course.
2. **Don't Multitask**:- Pay attention in class. When you Multitask outside of the given topic... way less information is getting solidified in your brain!
3. **Dig Deep**: Attempt all work, not for the sake of just doing it, but trying to understand the concepts, learning them in the process. “Practice makes perfect” applies not only to music and sports but also in learning. Be sure to schedule sufficient time to complete your assigned tasks before the next class period.
4. **Get Help**: Sometimes we are scared to admit we don't know something or how to do something: Consult with Curtis via Email or other social media device/app. Look online for further information - THAT MEANS RESEARCH.
5. **DO a Little Something Every Day**: Don't leave all the work until the weekend. No one can “digest” so much crazy technology all at once, no matter how much time you

spend trying. This stuff is best studied in bite-sized, digestible pieces. It is like learning a language or hitting a baseball.

6. **Get Organized and Learn to Take Good Notes:** Do I really need to elaborate on this- If so- then you are NOT organized and you are not a good note-taker. Science proves these things can help!

7. **Collaborate:** Find other students to work with. Group work is very productive. You will learn from each other! and share ideas, thoughts, concepts...

## General Course Rules & Code of Conduct

2. Please, no video games or watching films during class, specifically during the critiques. Please don't disrupt the course with unrelated dialogue with fellow students. **(when on campus)**

5. All written assignments must be typed in Word or directly in the Canvas assignment/discussion. *Sorry, hand-written assignments will not be accepted.*

## Discussion Guidelines

Netiquette, also known as 'net etiquette,' refers to using respectful and inclusive language with proper tone and mechanics (including full sentences), as well as courtesy and respect for others' opinions, when you are communicating in online discussion forums. Instructors may interpret breaches of netiquette as disruptive behavior. Communicating effectively in an online class can help build community and engagement. Please keep the following guidelines in mind:

- **Identify yourself by your real name.** Be mindful of your personal safety, and avoid including personal information, such as phone numbers or addresses, in discussion forums. All online communications should be transmitted with the intent to inform and inspire, not to offend or breach personal privacy. Never use private information about other individuals and be sensitive to the information you share about yourself.
- **Write in the first person.**
- **Use humor, joking, or sarcasm with caution.** We often rely on non-verbal cues such as facial expressions to communicate joking or sarcasm; but these cues are not always clear in an online environment.
- **Be professional, clear and respectful.** Clear and effective writing translates to clear and effective communication. Writing the way you would speak is a good rule of thumb. Use a positive tone and adhere to the same rules you would follow in face-to-face communications. As well, use proper grammar, spelling and formatting, and check all communications before sending. Respond to colleagues in a prompt manner.
- **Read and formulate communications carefully.** Take the time to think about the information contained in all of your online communications. This will allow you to thoughtfully consider all points, reduces confusion and prepares you for a valid response. You can in return, research your facts and provide citations for information stated within your communications. This promotes a robust academic environment and adds credibility to any course. Re-read communications before sending to avoid emotional and or "all capital letter" statements and keep communications meaningful and succinct.

- **Be tolerant and cooperative.** Keep in mind that all students are here to learn, and anyone can make a simple mistake in research, knowledge or communication. Address the idea or concept, not the person. Keep an open mind and focus on the goal of learning. When adverse communications or conflicts arise, try to help rather than hinder. True cooperation means working together to the same end; everyone wants to be successful.
