Course Description and Objectives: This course offers an introduction to basic grammar as it relates to writing and other communication skills. It covers parts of speech, sentence structure, types of phrases and clauses, verb tenses and agreement, noun possessives and plurals, pronoun usage, comparison, capitalization, punctuation, and other related topics.

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, a student will be able to label simple and advanced sentence patterns, employ standard rules of pluralization and possession, choose and spell verb tenses correctly, apply principles of pronoun agreement and construct sentences with correct subject/verb agreement, and combine simple sentences into correctly punctuated compound and complex sentences.

III. Attendance and Common Sense Rules

Missed class time cannot be made-up by reading somebody’s notes, seeing a tutor, doing an on-line tutorial, or reading a textbook. Choose wisely and take responsibility for your choices.

Also note that you must own the course textbook and your own set of handouts and bring them to class with you at all times. Without these materials your chances of success in this class are slim.
