Course content: This course will focus on advanced ESL vocabulary development, reading comprehension, grammar, and writing.

Prerequisite: Appropriate placement or completion of ESL level 5A.

Course description: Emphasizes skills leading to college-level reading and writing proficiency. There is intensive practice in writing and critical skills that students need in college courses.

Course objectives: Upon completion of course, students will: Write in-class essays of 250 words. Write outside class essays of 250-400 words. Analyze and understand the logic or lack of logic in written texts. Use a variety of idiomatic expressions correctly. Use Latin based vocabulary which is appropriate for academic writing. Produce varied sentence structures which include simple, compound and complex sentences. Punctuate sentences correctly. Use a variety of coordinating and subordinating conjunctions. Organize and a produce an essay which contains an introduction (with a thesis), well-developed body paragraphs (that have topic sentences, statements with support and conclusions) and conclusions. Proofread and edit their own work for categorical errors. Write a simple narrative, argument, comparison/contrast, and expository essay.

Evaluation: All homework, writings and in-class activities will be evaluated.

Grading: To pass this course, a student will need 70% of the total points:

Home Essays: 20% of grade. In-Class Essays: 40% of grade.

Homework and grammar tests: 20% of grade. Participation, guizzes and other: 20% of grade.

In addition, a student should pass the writing final to pass this course.

Student Learning Objectives:

- 1) Make syntactical and lexical choices which are appropriate for the content and an academic audience.
- 2) Produce a 250 word essay on an academic subject. The essay will be well organized and have adequate support of the thesis.
- 3) Edit and correct grammar, spelling and punctuation errors.
- 4) Differentiate fact from opinion.

- 2) Tardiness being late. If you are more than 20 minutes late to class, or come back from the break more than 15 minutes after it ends, you will be marked absent for half the class. Each class we will get a 20 minute break. Plan to come to class on time and return from the break on time.
- 3) Cell phones should not be in use during our class time. Feel free to make calls during the break, if necessary. - 4) Plagiarism and completing your own writings. It is vital that you do all your writing for this class. Do not copy essays or writings. Do not have other people do your writings. I understand that you have friends, classmates, or family members that might help you. Those people should not correct your grammar and sentences. They should only talk with you about the ideas in your writings and the organization of your writings.
- 5) Textbooks. You need to complete the homework from the textbooks and reading books. Every week there will probably be homework. Make sure you get it done!
- 6) Class participation. It is important that you participate in class discussions and activities. Only use English during class participation activities. I would like you to think of this room as an English zone. If someone asks you to translate for them, please don't. This is <u>not</u> a translation course.
- 7) Respect for other students is important in this class. Please respect other people's opinions, life and ideas. It is OK to disagree.
- 8) Complete assignments on time and get the homework from your instructor or another student when you are absent.
- 9) Final Exam. There will be a final exam on June 3. It will be an in-class essay. Do not be absent.
- 10) Laptops. Bringing a laptop to class can help you with your learning. However, during in-class essays you will not be allowed to have internet access with your laptop. Moreover, using your laptop to check email or surf the web during class lectures can result in a reduction of in-class participation points.
- 11) Disruptive behavior will not be tolerated in class. Side conversations and talking during lectures will result in a deduction of class participation points.
