REQUIRED TEXTS AND MATERIALS:

CATALOG COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course involves development of awareness of community needs in relation to:

- Creates awareness of current needs of families and individuals in relation to their community.
- The topics may involve buying practices, research of public agencies available to the community, family life span issues, or development of mini courses in various areas of FCS to present to community groups.

COURSE OBJECTIVES/EXIT COMPETENCIES:

Upon completion of this course, students will have the following exit competencies. The student will be able to:

1. analyze community needs ;
2. examine needs of the family;
3. examine need of the individual ;
4. examine the challenge of families;
5. research of public agencies available to the community;
6. discuss the role of institutions in community building and implement the services;
7. have fun & enjoy life!

SUPPLIES NEEDED FOR CLASS:

Text book and materials; blue pen, red pen, colored pencils, fine point markers, three- ringed notebook for “Journal Writing/Assignments” and additional notebook “Class Lecture Notes.”

REQUIRED ASSIGNMENTS:

All work is to be done by each student. Please refer to ASSIGNMENT LIST for dates and assignments.

EXAMINATIONS AND PROJECTS: To be announced.

EVALUATION: Grading criteria is listed below. Each assignment will be awarded point value. Class attendance, notes, journal assignments, quizzes, exams, and homework assignments, will all receive points which will be added up at the end of the semester for a total grade. The standard 90 – 100% A, 89 – 80% B, 79 – 70% C, 69 -60% D and below 60% F will be used. Note: Extra credit will be offered and is optional.

ADDITIONAL COURSE INFORMATION:

All assignments and projects must be turned in on or before the due date. Points equivalent to one letter grade will be deducted for each week an assignment is late. Late assignments that are more than 1 week late will not be accepted unless special arrangements have been made prior with the instructor.

It is the student's responsibility to attend class. Attendance and class participation contribute to 10% points of your total grade. Sign in sheets will be circulated toward the end of class and your attendance is based upon those sheets. If you do not attend the entire class, you will not earn the point for that class. It is your responsibility to contact the instructor when situations arise.

A student who has special needs, disabilities and/or accommodations must speak with the instructor at the beginning of the semester and state specific needs in order to have the instructor accommodate those needs i.e. class seating, lecture notes, quizzes, assignments, etc.

Students are expected to do and turn in their OWN work. A student identified as cheating will FAIL the exam or the assignment. DO NOT COPY from one another.

Respect and honesty is expected throughout the semester as stated from the instructor at the beginning of the semester.

GUIDELINES FOR WRITTEN WORK:

When a student prepares a paper for a class, he/she is presenting 'self' to the reader. Your work must be NEAT and ORDERLY. Contents as well as neatness, spelling, and English usage/punctuation are considered when grades are given. All work must be done on the forms provided or 8 ½ X 11 inch paper, typewritten or clearly written in INK. Do not use pencil. Staple pages together and do not use paper clips. It is the responsibility of the student to come prepared and to keep a copy of ALL pages submitted.

Take neat and clear notes during lecture. Use your notebook to take lecture notes. Remember, if the instructor writes something down or emphasizes the information, it is because it will be something you are expected to know for the exam. So take GOOD notes!

CLASS POLICIES: Student conduct in all of the Los Angeles Community Colleges must conform to the District and College rules and regulations. Violations of such rules and regulations may result in disciplinary action.

CLASS EXPECTATIONS:

1. No texting.
2. Come prepared.
3. Show up on time.
4. Turn off cell phones.
5. Keep notes in sequence and in order.
6. No interruption when teacher or student is talking.
7. Confidentiality. Respect and keep things confidential. No gossip or slander.
8. Inform the instructor of personal agendas, excuses, etc. (I consider those who consider).
(I encourage collaboration and free open forum, but be aware and sensitive of those times when only one person is sharing, etc. to show respect and courtesy).

ADDING/EXCLUDING STUDENTS: After the semester begins, students must have a signed add card by the instructor. Once, the add card is signed, students are required to submit to admissions and a stamped add slip needs to be returned to the instructor. It is your responsibility to monitor your enrollment. Follow through with dates and drop policy procedure.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

As a result of completing this course, students will:

1. Research and develop a project by determining the needs of their community.
2. Implement 25 hours of internship service learning at a community organization.
3. Present the results of their community project through written and oral presentations.

ATTENDANCE:

Regular and prompt attendance at all classes is expected of all students. All work missed by reason of absence or tardiness, regardless of the cause, must be made up to the satisfaction of the instructor. Students with excessive absences or tardiness (3 weeks in a row) will be dropped from this class. Develop a ‘buddy system’ and get the name of one or more student in this class so that you will know what you have missed. *Note: Refer to LAMC Calendar in Schedule of Classes for deadlines such as DROP dates. A new state policy in effect limits students to **3 attempts per course**. Receiving a grade or “W” for a course counts as an attempt, **regardless of when the course was taken**. This policy has been implemented where the LACCD will block you from attending the course that has three “W”s on your record.*
