Course Description: Designed to provide skills and fuller understanding of how individuals cope with social interactions that build, maintain or dissolve interpersonal relationships with friends, significant others, family members and coworkers.

Course Objective: To provide students with the knowledge and skills needed to effectively build, maintain and dissolve interpersonal relationships by understanding the interpersonal communication process, dynamics of interpersonal communication, intercultural communication, self-concept, influences on perception, verbal and non-verbal communication, listening, communication climates, managing conflict and effectively communicating in intimate, familial and work-related interpersonal relationships.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course Students will be able to complete the following:

Method of Instruction:

Course Assignment Overview: (All Assignments will be emailed to you and posted on my website.)

- Participation and Homework (25%):
 - Participation is a key component of this course. To receive participation points, students must be present, on-time, and ready to engage in classroom discussion and activities. To effectively participate in classroom discussion students should complete homework assignments and course reading materials. Students who are not prepared and who do not actively engage in classroom discussion or activities will not receive full participation points. Note that points are not just given for showing up. You must participate in discussion and in-class activities. Absences, being tardy or leaving class early will result in lower participation points. Each incident will result in a minimum of a five point deduction.
 - Each week you will receive homework in the form of a reading assignment, discussion questions or other type of activity. *YOU MUST CHECK YOUR EMAIL ON A WEEKLY BASIS TO CHECK FOR HOMEWORK ASSIGNMENTS!* Homework on average should take you between 30-60 minutes to complete. Failure to complete or turn in homework will result in lost points. Be sure to keep track of the points missed and received.
- Communicator Self Assessment Assignment Part 1 (6%): This assignment will require you to analyze your current communication skills and determine what level you want your skills to eventually be.
- Self- Concept Investigation Paper (7%): This assignment will require you to investigate how you perceive yourself and how others perceive you. You will examine your self-concept and see how your self-concept affects your perception and ultimately how you interpret communication on how you communicate with others.
- Reflection Dialogue Papers (26%): You will be asked to complete three Reflection Dialogue papers, worth 35 points each. Each Reflection Dialogue will focus on a different interaction and different type of relationship. You will provide an overview of the dialogue that occurred and dissect what is going on in the dialogue. You will provide examples and explanations to demonstrate your understanding of the communication concepts learned in class. The first Reflection Dialogue will be on a familial relationship (parent-child, sibling-sibling, etc.). The second Reflection Dialogue will be on an intimate or personal relationship (significant other or close friendship). The third Reflection Dialogue will be on a work type of relationship (boss-employee, peer to peer, etc.). Your Reflection Dialogues will be similar to the Reflection Dialogues found in your textbook.

- Exams (20%): You will have two exams on course lecture and assigned readings. The exams will contain multiple choice and short answer essay questions.
- Case Study Group Presentation (7%): This assignment will require you to work with 3-4 classmates on a group presentation. Each group will be given a case study in which your team will need to analyze the case study data, explain possible communication issues, provide a recommendation of your findings and demonstrate the recommendations you prescribe for the given case scenario.
- Communicator Self Assessment Part 2 (7%): This assignment will require you to analyze what level your communication skills were at the beginning of the semester and compare them to where you are now. You will discuss what you learned and what skills you plan to work on in the future.

NOTE: *Late assignments are not accepted. All assignments need to be turned in class and on time.*

Los Angeles Mission College Policies:

LA Mission College Attendance Policy (p. 46):

- The student is expected to attend every meeting of all classes for which he or she is registered. A student absent from classes for emergency reasons must inform his or her instructor of the reason for the absence.

An evaluative grade ("A", "B", "C", "D", "F", "CR", or "NC") will be assigned to students who are enrolled past the end of the 14th week. After the last day of the 14th week (or 75% of the time the class is scheduled, whichever is less) the student may petition to withdraw from class demonstrating extenuating circumstances.

*Incompletes are only given when *all requirements* are met.

Standards of Student Conduct: Academic dishonesty and disobedience will not be tolerated. Any Violations of the Standards of Student Conduct will result in penalties to be determined by College Authorities.
