

- did not attend LAMC last semester, complete an application form. Bring proof of your social security number.

Assessment & Orientation

Upon submitting an application to the college, all new non-exempt (see Matriculation Steps to Success in the catalog) students are required to make an appointment for the assessment process. The results from the assessment process will help place students into the appropriate level of English or ESL & Math courses for their first semester. All new students are encouraged to participate in orientation. Students will learn about the college, educational programs, services, degree requirements and more.

7. Add classes: Press I to add classes.

If a class you select is full and you choose to be placed on standby, you will not be enrolled in the class and you will not be charged for the class. Your standby status will be printed on your Registration/Fee receipt. The class instructor will receive a printout of the standby list prior to the first class meeting.
